

Christmas I

In this bulletin I will be examining one of the two great Solemnities of our liturgical year: that of Christmas. This Solemnity, just like the one of Easter, lasts for eight days, so we talk about the octave of Christmas and that of Easter.

Christians were not the first to have festivals that last eight days: there are such festivals in the Jewish religion. Passover lasts eight days, as does the feast of Booths (Tabernacles) and Hanukkah. So, it follows that the Church took that tradition from the Jews.

The Christmas Solemnity is different from the Easter one as it has within it some Feast days. It is as if there was a need to insist on some specific points. The first day of Christmas reminds us of Jesus being born to a poor family away from home; the second day tells us that as a result of Jesus being born into the world, Stephen was stoned to death and so became the first martyr of the Gospel. The third day celebrates the Evangelist, Saint John, who insisted that this Jesus born into the world was the Son of God, as well as the Word of the Father. The fourth day of Christmas reminds us that because of the birth of Jesus, King Herod had all the young boys in the region murdered, hoping to kill Jesus among them; and all because the Magi came to him asking where they could find Jesus.

Saint Francis of Assisi is the one who came up with the props of the stable, the ox and the donkey. And made a big thing of the Angels and shepherds, as mentioned in Saint Luke's Gospel. This first day of Christmas seems at least peaceful. Although Jesus was born in a stable, there were shepherds and Angels around.

In the Nativity scene, we stress that Jesus was born in a low state to poor parents. He was not part of those who directed this world order. On the fourth day of Christmas, we recall the reaction of Herod to his meeting with the Magi, who stated that a King was born and were looking for him. Herod asked the theologians where the King was to be born and was told that it was in Bethlehem, the City of David. Instead of being happy that such a King was born, he was determined to have him killed so that the Scriptures would not be fulfilled at his disadvantage. So, all the young boys of the area were slaughtered.

Important people are usually born of important families among the aristocracy, as were Julius Caesar and Alexander, among others. And the fact that they were so successful implied that they had to be of a status superior to the leading class. It seemed to those around them that their superiority was due to the Divine, that one of their parents was probably not a human being but a god or a goddess with whom the human had had sexual relations.

At Christmas we have the world upside down: Jesus is the Son of God born outside of sexual relations to a Virgin, a poor lass from an unimportant family betrothed to a poor carpenter, a descendant of David from a branch that did not produce anyone of importance after Solomon.
