

LAST SUNDAY'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

This time around I want to re-examine the three readings of last Sunday's Mass, as they seem to complement each other rather remarkably.

Paul's text basically tells us that as Catholics we are to pray for our nation and our leaders, just like we do most weeks in the prayers of the faithful. We ask God to make them wise and govern us well.

Amos' text is a very strong diatribe against the rich and powerful, the exploiters of the poor. This fellow calls on the wrath of God against the dishonest and the powerful.

And then, in the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable that goes against everything we found in the other two texts. In it, the manager is described as a swindler and a crook. He represents exactly the dishonesty condemned by Amos.

In the Gospel, the steward has been accused of depleting his master's goods and has just been given his notice. This fellow does not have his master's interest at heart. He is there for what he can get for himself. Now that he is about to lose his livelihood, he is looking for a way to save himself.

He does so, by making use of his master's money. He summons his master's various creditors to come and he changes their bills to their advantage in the hope that they would be grateful for this deed and would reward him by receiving him in their homes. Just as he looks after their interests (with his master's money!), he hopes to have them look after him.

When his master is told of this fraudulent scheme, he says that this dishonest steward is wise. Why? Because the steward is planning for his future, he is looking after himself!

Jesus then bemoans the fact that «the children of light» do not show as much «wisdom» as «the children of this world!» Somehow, this seems a bit much! Jesus is offering the crook as good example: someone who is looking after himself instead of others, someone who stands not for the Kingdom but for this world's order of «Me, myself and I!» How can we make sense of this?

The point Jesus is making here is that the children of God, should work on how to get to Heaven just like this fellow is working on how to be welcomed by others. How is it that they are so slow at acting upon it? Knowing that getting to Heaven is in their interest, why are they so reluctant to do what it takes? After all, He told them what to do and they are not moving. Why can't they be as eager to get to Heaven as some capitalist who is out to make her first million before the age of twenty-five?

Everything that we have in this life is not really ours: it all belongs to God, our Master. So, Jesus is saying: «steal» from God (use your God-given gifts) and use them in ways to help you earn heaven. Make sure that you will have a happy «retirement» after this life by getting yourself «popular» with God's creditors by reducing the debt you really owe Him for the life you have led and since the goods that you consider your own are really God's.
